Annual inflation for May 2012 was 2.1 per cent

Statistics Canada estimated that consumer prices rose, on average, by 0.32 per cent in Calgary, 0.40 per cent in Alberta and 1.24 per cent in Canada, for the month of May 2012 over May 2011. In this period on an annual (12-month-moving-average) basis, inflation was 2.1 per cent in Calgary, 2.2 per cent in Alberta and 2.5 per cent in Canada.


The inflation rate in Calgary was driven by prices increase in water, fuel and electricity (11.6 per cent), gasoline (9.8 per cent), transportation (3.7 per cent) and food (3.3 per cent). Lower prices for clothing and footwear (-1.5 per cent) and recreation, education and reading (-0.1 per cent) served to moderate the rate of price inflation.

- Water, fuel and electricity accounts for a 5.7 per cent share of the household budget and therefore added 0.656 percentage points to the overall inflation rate.
- Transportation costs account for 21.1 per cent of the household budget and therefore added 0.787 percentage points to the overall inflation rate. The transportation cost increase was driven by increases in the price of gasoline (13.1 per cent).
- Finally, food prices rose by an average of 3.3 per cent and accounted for an average of 15 per cent of household expenditures. Consequently, food added 0.494 percentage points to the overall inflation rate.




