## Calgary's headline inflation increased in February 2014

# The year-over-year headline inflation rates for Calgary and Alberta were higher than the national average

In February 2014, Calgary's headline inflation slowed to 2.9 per cent over the same month last year. Consumer prices increased 2.4 per cent in Alberta and 1.1 per cent in Canada in February (Chart 1).

Consumer prices rose in all eight major categories in Calgary. Significant cost increases were observed in shelter (4.9 per cent), recreation, education and reading (3 per cent), alcoholic beverages and tobacco products (2.9 per cent), and food (2.6 per cent). Other gains were in clothing and footwear (1.4 per cent), transportation (2.2 per cent), and household operations, furnishings and equipment (2.2 per cent).

## Food prices in Calgary are picking up

Inflation in Calgary was boosted by higher food prices. Out of the eight major components in the consumer basket, food has the third largest weight. In February 2014, the 12-month-moving-average of food prices in Calgary advanced 2.1 per cent, the highest gain since November 2012. Grocery costs were up by 1.7 per cent and restaurant bills by 3 per cent (Chart 2). Among the commonly purchased food items from grocery stores, vegetables recorded the biggest gains in February, up by 6.8 per cent. The prices for fruits and nuts increased by 4.1 per cent, fish and seafood by 2.5 per cent, and eggs by 2.5 per cent. Food prices are likely to climb higher in the coming months as a result of the depreciation of the Canadian dollar, the drought in California and the frigid weather in parts of the United States and Central Canada.

# Calgary's 12-month-moving-average inflation rate was estimated at 2.1 per cent. The following are the major contributors to Calgary's consumer price changes:


*Food*: The 12-month-moving-average for food prices advanced 2.1 per cent in February 2014, which contributed 0.34 percentage point to Calgary's overall inflation.

**Shelter**: In February 2014, shelter costs rose by 4.4 per cent, which added 1.18 percentage points to overall inflation in Calgary. Prices for water, fuel and electricity increased 10.1 per cent in February compared to 8 per cent in January 2014.

*Transportation*: Transportation prices increased by 1 per cent in February 2014, which contributed 0.2 percentage point to the overall inflation rate in Calgary. Retail gasoline prices advanced 0.9 per cent in February for the 12-month-moving-average.


