

Calgary Economic Region (CER)

Highlights*:



Total employment in the Calgary Economic Region (CER) registered its second consecutive monthly decline in January 2021. Employment decreased by 13,000 persons from a month ago and is down 14,900 persons from a year ago. The total unemployed in the CER was 98,100, down slightly from 98,300 a month ago, and up from 65,400 from a year ago.

The January labour force survey was conducted on the week of January 10 to 16, when Alberta's state of public health emergency with enhanced public health measures was still in place. The provincial government has announced that some restrictions will be lifted on February 8, which will include the return of in-person dining at commercial establishments. Potential future steps would include further easing of in person services and activities, and will be based on hospitalization benchmarks (i.e. fewer hospitalizations will allow for fewer public health restrictions).

In January 2021, the average employee wage rate in the Calgary Census Metropolitan Area (CMA) was \$1,237 per week. From December 2020 to January 2021, the total wage bill for all employees in the Calgary CMA increased by \$3.8 million, following last month's decrease of \$9.0 million.


Chart 1 compares how employment by industry has changed since 2015 in the CER and Edmonton Economic Region (EER). Total employed in the CER and EER since 2015 is down (-7,700) and (-42,000), respectively, reflecting relatively heavier industrial job losses in the EER. Many of these losses have been magnified by oil price weakness and pandemic related job losses in 2020. The Accommodation and food services sector was particularly hard hit, with a year-over-


year decline of (-21) per cent in the CER and (-31) per cent in the EER. The CER's 2020 employment total of 834,000 is the lowest since 2016 (828,600), while the EER's 2020 employment total of 726,200 is the lowest since 2012 (719,800).

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Chart 2 examines employment growth by industry from 2015 to 2020 in Alberta and how the province has fared relative to Canada. Broadly speaking, employment in Alberta has fared worse than Canada, as Alberta endured a dual impact from the COVID-19 pandemic and crude oil price collapse. Alberta has recorded a 5.5 per cent decline in total employment, relative to a 0.6 per cent gain for Canada over the 2015 to 2020 time period. Two bright spots for Alberta have been Educational services and Health care and social assistance. Combined, these two industries are responsible for 21 per cent of employment in Alberta.
