


Extreme Weather Response *

Transit Social Disturbances


Monthly disturbance calls originating from the public and Transit Public Safety officers city-wide.


Calgary Fire Overdose Response


Calgary Fire Department (CFD) city-wide overdose response data.

CFD supports Alberta Health Services (AHS) Emergency Medical Services (EMS) by co-responding to life-threatening medical emergencies like drug poisonings.







Featured Program:

East Ambassador Program

The program helps vulnerable communities on the streets access service referrals for help, and provides real-time, on-the-ground data to improve what we know about these vulnerable communities through building trust and relationship.

Community Impact

- In 2023/2024, the East Ambassador Program had 3950 interactions with community members, including support for 15 emergencies.
- Other highlights include:
 - Providing 2629 water bottles for vulnerable people
 - Distributing 514 Naloxone Kits
 - Providing 181 First Aid supplies
 - Supporting 175 Housing check-ins
 - Providing 60 Needs and service questionnaire intakes
 - Provided 19 First Aid treatments

University of Calgary Expansion in the Downtown

The University of Calgary and The City of Calgary announced a new partnership to convert an underused office tower (801 7 Ave. S.W.) into active academic, teaching, and research space. This expansion to the university's downtown campus will transform 180,000 square feet into the new home for the University of Calgary's School of Architecture, Planning, and Landscape (SAPL) that includes design studios, classrooms, research spaces, a robotic fabrication workshop, an exhibition gallery, and a community-facing design justice lab. This project will help to increase the overall economic activity, vibrancy and safety in the greater downtown area while also reducing downtown office vacancy. Tracking our Progress on Downtown Safety 🍣



The Downtown Safety Leadership Table was a representative group of downtown leaders convened to help identify opportunities, solutions, and strategies to address safety issues in downtown Calgary. In March 2024, they released 28 <u>recommendations</u> to support safety and vibrancy in Calgary's downtown. We are pleased to say that work is already underway on all 28 recommendations in the timelines anticipated. The work is targeted to three key areas: great public spaces, wellbeing of people, and emergency response and enforcement.
