Mayor's Urban Design Awards – Urban Fragments

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Wandering Island is a site-specific, collaborative art project on Elbow Island, a park located beneath Mission Bridge in Calgary/Mohkinstsis. This park balances precariously between city + nature, land + river, public + private, camouflaged + forgotten. The Wandering Island has a mandate to create slow art for the audience of birds, bats, beaver, fish, and the occasional curious wanderer.

The Wandering Island was conceived by our team of local artists, Caitlind r.c. Brown, Wayne Garrett, and Lane Shordee. We began working on the project in 2017, straddling the roles of artists and organizers in a position sometimes called "Lead Artists." In this role, we worked with Calgary Public Art, the City of Calgary, and a variety of consultants to identify opportunities for artists to create artful infrastructure and island interventions at different timescales, including permanent, long-term, temporary, and ephemeral artworks. The project transpired as a series of fragments: benches, stepping stones, stairs, documentary films, an event, and more.

The first artwork on The Wandering Island is Fish Ladder, a stairway designed by lead artists Caitlind r.c. Brown & Wayne Garrett. These stairs mirror the ribs of a canoe, ripples, or the skeleton of a fish, transitioning from metal to organic material, indicating to visitors that they are entering an unusual place.

Three artist-designed benches line the 2 km path leading to the end of the island, including Bridging Whirlds by father/daughter team Laura & Michael Hosaluk, Late Lunch by friends Jeremy Pavka & Sean Procyk and Sun Chairs by former partners Susan Clarahan & Joel Staples. Bench artists were invited to

create their ideal 'together place' to sit along the Elbow River. Late Lunch, wheelbarrow chairs by Jeremy Pavka & Sean Procyk

A rock ford allows visitors to traverse an ephemeral stream cutting through the island. This stream floods in the Spring. Stepping stones are scrawled with inscriptions by Inuk artist Kablusiak in a piece called Things that both a relative you haven't seen in a long time and the river could say. Stone seats by lead artist Lane Shordee invite visitors to take an Ephemeral Perch while contemplating river-time.

From the beginning of the project, we worked with documentary filmmaker Ramin Eshraghi-Yazdi and photographer Mike Tan, creating hundreds of photographs and 7 mini-documentaries about the project. When *The Wandering Island* opened in September 2021, visitors were invited to wander through *Soundscapes in the Landscape*, follow a choose-your-own-adventure tour, or take an eco-walk with Elder Pablo Russell.

The project was intended to continue for 5 years with a seasonal series of site-responsive ephemeral artworks, but was ended early in the hand-off from Calgary Public Art to CADA. Benches, stairs, and stepping stones remain in Elbow Island Park.
